#### Congresswoman Kelly Announces Teaching the Hudson Valley Grants

On Friday August 11, [Congresswoman Sue Kelly](#) (New York's 19<sup>th</sup> Congressional District) joined HRVNHA Acting Director Mary Mangione and Sarah Olson of the [National Park Service](#) to announce three Teaching the Hudson Valley Grants for the 2006-07 school year. The event took place on a beautiful late summer day at the [New Windsor Cantonment](#) State Historic Site in New Windsor, NY, the site where the cease fire orders were issued by General George Washington ending the eight-year War of Independence on April 19, 1783. Re-enactors in period dress livened up the proceedings with a demonstration of military maneuvers, firing their rifles in unison. Three area schools were on hand to receive their grants: McQuade Children's Services, Town of New Windsor; SS Seward Institute, Village of Florida; Woodside Elementary School, City of Peekskill.

#### Great Hudson Valley Pedal

The second annual [Great Hudson Valley Pedal](#) began in Albany on Tuesday, August 15<sup>th</sup>, and concluded in New York City on Sunday, August 20<sup>th</sup>. Cyclists from 22 states participated in the 200 mile recreational bike tour through the Hudson Valley, making stops at numerous historic sites along the way. ## Anderson School Trail Opening

On August 16, 2006, the [Anderson School](#) in Staatsburgh held a ribbon cutting ceremony for their newly-unveiled "Outdoor Sensory Art Garden." The one-acre site was developed by students of the school as a sensory arts garden where they can experience nature and art while improving their math, language and science skills. The Greenway provided a \$10,000 grant to aid in the development of the trail, along with the The Gap Fishkill Distribution Office, and New York State with the help of Assemblyman Joel Miller, R-Poughkeepsie. The Anderson School serves adults and children with autism and other related developmental disabilities.

## Patriots Weekend 2006 "The March to Victory --The Crossing at King's Ferry"

In the summer of 1781, French troops under the command of Rochambeau marched from New England to Yorktown, VA, where they fought side-by-side with General Washington's army in the final defeat of the British. On August 26 and 27, they crossed the Hudson River from Verplanck to Stony Point at the King's Ferry. The 225th anniversary of this event was commemorated on August 25-27, 2006. The celebration included lectures by key historians, military reenactments, period music, and a naval demonstration. ### *Other Grant Opportunities:*

[Laura Jane Musser Fund Initiative to Promote Collaborative Process in Environmental Decision Making](#) Four to six programs will receive up to \$35,000 each for efforts to engage residents of rural areas in environmental decision making, management, and volunteerism. (September 5, 2006)

[CDBG Community Development Technical Assistance Grants](#) provide eligible cities, towns, villages and counties in New York State with an opportunity to secure technical assistance in order to prepare a community development strategic plan. Strategic Planning Technical Grants are available and communities may apply for a maximum of \$25,000 for assistance to develop a strategic plan that will aid in the progression of the community's "vision". (September 8, 2006)

[Agri-Tourism Grants:](#) The New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets invites proposals for a matching grant program for the development, implementation or expansion of projects or activities which will promote New York State food and agriculture through Agri-tourism. (September 11)

[Consultation Grants for Museums, Libraries and Special Projects](#) The National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) invites applications for consultation grants that help museums, libraries, historical organizations and community organizations develop humanities projects. Grants may be used to meet with advisers, program partners and representatives of target audiences; travel to relevant collections; seek out advisers; and develop humanities projects. (September 12, 2006)

[Restore NY Communities:](#) Restore NY is a new program announced by Governor Pataki to encourage economic development and neighborhood growth by providing municipalities with financial assistance for revitalization of commercial and residential properties. The maximum grant a municipality may receive is \$5 million and each award must be matched by a municipal contribution of at least 10 percent. Only municipalities may apply. (September 15)

[Advanced Transportation Technologies](#) The New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA) has announced a program to support the development, demonstration, and commercialization of innovative transportation products, systems, and services. (September 27, 2006)

[Partners for Fish and Wildlife Program Department of the Interior, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service](#) provides financial assistance to landowners interested in restoring fish and wildlife habitat on their own lands. It is a goal of the program to secure at least 50 percent of project costs from non-Service sources, but this goal applies to the program as a whole, and does not have to be achieved on a project-by-project basis. (September 30, 2006)

**Conservation Project Support Grants:** The Institute of Museum and Library Services provides matching grants to help museums develop a logical, institution-wide approach to caring for their collections. Applicants should apply for the project that meets the institution's highest conservation needs. The primary goal of the project must be conservation care. (October 1)

**Recreational Trails Program:** A matching grant program for the acquisition, development, rehabilitation and maintenance of trails and trail-related projects. Funds are available to non-profit organizations, municipal, state and federal agencies, Indian tribal governments and other public agencies and authorities. Funded projects must be identified in, or further a specific goal of, the SCORP and must be available to the general public. Application Workshop dates are listed [here](#) (October 13)



**Water Quality Improvement Projects and Dam Safety Projects:** Funding for water quality improvement projects including Nonagricultural Nonpoint Source Abatement and Control, MS4 - Phase II, Stormwater Implementation, Municipal Wastewater Improvement, Water Quality Management, and Aquatic Habitat Restoration. (October 20)

**Historic preservation:** Letters of inquiry regarding grants from the Worldwide Grant Program, administered by Tourism Cares for Tomorrow. Grants of up to \$100,000 each will support the conservation and restoration of historic, cultural, and natural sites of interest around the world. Additional information is available on the organization's Web site. (November 1)

**Ecosystem Protection and Restoration:** Proposals for grants from the Fund for Wild Nature for projects to protect or restore natural ecosystems. The fund supports advocacy, litigation, monitoring, public-policy work, and some media projects. Additional information is available on the organization's Web site. Who may apply: organizations that are classified as tax-exempt under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code or have a nonprofit fiscal sponsor. (November 3)

**Institute of Museum and Library Services Museums for America** program is used to sustain cultural heritage, support learning and to help museums be centers of community endowment through the support of activities that advance the institution's mission and strategic goals. Grants range from \$5,000 to \$150,000. (November 15, 2006)

**Dyson Foundation's Strategic Restructuring Initiative** supports the collaboration of two or more organizations intent on establishing a continuing relationship in order to increase efficiency and service. Grants varying from \$10,000 to \$35,000 will be awarded in four categories: assessment, planning, integration, and enhancement. Organizations should consult the foundation's Web site for details on each category. (Open)

**Historical preservation grants from the Travelers Conservation Foundation.** Support will be given to projects designed to conserve, protect, and restore sites of exceptional cultural, historic, or natural significance, and to promote public awareness of and participation in those conservation activities. Priority will be given to projects that are linked to tourism, that are endorsed by local tourism offices, and that have the potential for duplication in other communities. (Open)

## Heritage Spotlight

**Lindenwald: Martin Van Buren National Historic Site**



Lindenwald was the retirement home of Martin Van Buren, America's eighth president. Its opulent interior affords a glimpse into the lives of the upper class in the Hudson River Valley in the mid-19th century.

When Van Buren (1782-1862) returned to his hometown of Kinderhook in 1841, after his service as U.S. Senator, Vice President, and President, he purchased a two-story Georgian house and 220 surrounding acres. He turned the house into a country seat, retaining its most impressive design elements - the

historic vessels, educational displays, boat rides, music, and other activities for the whole family.

He is responsible for the Tuscan-style tower, as well as the front porch, which combines elements of Gothic and Romanesque design.

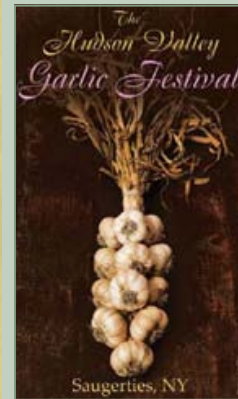
Lindenwald has been restored by the National Park Service to reflect the grand lifestyle Van Buren led there. Reproductions of the Brussels carpets he purchased for the house complement Empire furniture (much of which belonged to him), as well as china and artwork. Visitors also tour the restored servants' quarters and learn how the house kept running.

## Trails Spotlight

### [Hudson River Valley Ramble](#)

Now in its 7th year, the **Hudson River Valley Ramble** will take place during the weekends of September 16-17 and 23-24. Over 160 events are being offered this year including hikes, bikes, walks, historic site tours, festivals and river explorations. Many exciting events take place at National Heritage Area sites and on designated Greenway Trails throughout the region.



The **Olana Crown Hill Road Ramble** follows the carriage roads that were laid out by Hudson River School Artist Fredrick Church to highlight river and mountain views and the picturesque landscape of his property. On the **Turkey Point Ice Cove Walk**, naturalists will lead ramblers through various habitats on the way to an exploration of the Hudson River shoreline at low tide. The **Old Hurley Heritage Walk** includes a guided tour of the Main Street Historic District. Settled in 1661, this is one of the oldest clusters of stone houses in the U.S. This Ramble also includes an optional walk along the new, and recently designated, Hurley O&W Rail Trail. The **Sunday Morning Family Ramble** begins with a walk through historic Huger Street in New Paltz, and then follows the Walkkill Valley Rail Trail. The **Sunset Reading at Poets' Walk Romantic Landscape Park** features the paths that inspired Washington Irving and ends with poetry readings, refreshments and a bonfire at sunset.

The **Mills-Norrie River Trail Ramble** includes a walk with a naturalist along a designated Greenway Trail that hugs the Hudson River and ends at the great lawn of Mills-Norrie Mansion, tours of which are offered throughout the day. On the **Old Croton Aqueduct Trail Trek**, ramblers will enjoy a 6-mile walk along the path on top of this landmark 19th century tunnel that brought NYC its first clean water in 1842, with historic interpretation provided along the way.

## Did You Know...



The Hudson River was briefly named "River of Prince Mauritius"?



The Hudson River was not named such until 1664, fifty-five years after Henry Hudson, the Captain of a Dutch ship for Holland's East India Company, sailed up this river in search of the mythical Northwest Passage in September of 1609. Henry Hudson originally referred to the river as the "Manhatees". However, the Dutch, as they colonized the valley, formally named it the "River of the Prince Mauritius". Then in 1664, as England tried to legitimize its conquest over the region, the English argued that since Henry Hudson was a subject of England's king, the river belonged to them and named the river "Hudson".

Native tribes had named the river long before Hudson's arrival; one of their names being *Muhheakantuck*, meaning "great waters in constant motion". Today, this has been more loosely interpreted as meaning the "river that flows two ways" which highlights the river as a tidal estuary, where the sea's salt water meets the land's fresh water. The Hudson estuary spans 153 miles from Troy to the New York Harbor, about half of the Hudson River's total length, with the tidal flow direction reflected in its tide. Usually, a current flowing north (a flood) is accompanied by a rising tide and a current flowing south is accompanied by a falling tide (an ebb).
